#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE...

Guest Night at the General Meeting on Oct. 8<sup>th</sup> was very successful. The Honourable James Bartleman was a most thoughtful, down-to-earth speaker. He spoke of being half-breed and growing up beside the dump, fortunately he was clever at school and with the support of a wealthy American, he completed an undergraduate degree at Western. When he became Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, he took this opportunity to try to do something for

Aboriginal children, who live on very isolated, northern Ontario reserves. He initiated book drives to stock school libraries, Club Amick, a program that allows children to own new books and provides reading camps, has enlisted the assistance of universities and corporations, etc. But he says that Aboriginal youth suicide rates remain far too high. Marianne Singh-Waraich, CFUW National Director of Education suggested to the audience that we write our MP's to request increased funding for Aboriginal schools.

Money received for the Daily Bread Food Bank amounted to \$1,170.00. Thank you for your generous donations. Thanks also to Fran Laphen and Barb Willoughby for looking after this endeavour.

Nancy Bailey was available to accept magazine subscriptions. We strongly urge our members to support our Club's fundraiser by purchasing magazines through Nancy or online at www.QSP.ca, using ID number 16530. We received a 5% loyalty bonus from QSP in the amount of \$137.58.

Avery Fleming is selling the Toronto Caucus December Memorial Luncheon tickets.

We received clarification of the Associate Membership Bylaw from National, with the information that "All Clubs must accept Associate Members - women who do not meet the academic qualifications defined in bylaw II.1, II.2 and II.3, as long as they support the objectives and purposes of CFUW". Over 75% of Clubs have Associate Members. The ratio of Associate members to Regular members can be 20:80. Our Club could have 74 Associates. You probably know interested, like-minded women who formerly could not join our Club; now you can invite them to join. Associate members pay full CFUW dues, have all privileges and responsibilities of CFUW, and their membership is fully transferable to any CFUW Club.

# CFUW ONTARIO COUNCIL NEWS...

# Standing Committee Saturday, September 26, 2009 Morning Session:

The morning session topic was LHINS, and the speaker was Juanita Gledhill, chair of the Hamilton Niagara Haldimand Brant LHIN. Juanita is an award-winning Human Resources professional, with 20 years' experience in the field, specializing in organizational development and operational leadership. She is principal in a Human Resources consulting practice.

In 2006 Ontario established 14 Local Health Integration Networks (LHINs) across the province to plan, integrate and fund local healthcare. They are run by 9-person volunteer Boards, whose members serve 2 to 3 year terms.

The LHINS mandate is to serve the local community, concentrating on

- Promoting wellness and prevention,
- Providing quality, accessible health care in the community.
- Guaranteeing that the system will be there for the long term.

The LHIN does not provide health services, but works closely and continuously with local providers: hospital Boards, mental health facilities, CCACs, for example, to provide funds for operating expenses based on local requirements. It does not fund capital costs, although it is consulted on them to ensure that local needs are met. Its community focus allows it to respond to differing communities: for example, Juanita's region contains two large First Nations communities and one Francophone community, while others may contain a large proportion of the elderly, all of which may require specialized attention.

Work is being done on new initiatives, both by individual LHINs and the provincial Ministry of Health and Long Term Care:

- Aging at Home: a 3-year. \$60 million dollar program of the province to fund, through LHINs, programs to allow the elderly to remain in their homes.
- Clinical Services Plan: continuously works to integrate information received from various sources.
- Integrated Health and Service Plans: developed by individual LHINs to supply a road map for the community outlining future services

In addition, work is being done on such goals as reducing wait times in Emergency Rooms and wait times for long term care; increasing hours of palliative care; increasing care for patients coming out of hospital, allowing them time at home to make decisions as to their future placement; services for children, especially for mental health; care at the end of life; care for those with disabilities; integrating information among LHINs to avoid duplication.

#### Afternoon Session: Legislation

From our Etobicoke Club, Ann McElhinney, Jo Ann Marriott and Linda Rose chose to attend the afternoon session for the Status of Women and Human Rights Standing Committee which was chaired by Edeltraud Neal. Ideas for raising our profile in the community were: offering free one-year memberships to women in support shelters, collecting "hotel" toiletries for women's shelters, giving scholarships to girls, inviting the community to General Meetings with speakers, having a film night, and writing letters to MPPs.

- Clubs described their recent and ongoing activities, which included child care, particularly the Pascal Report on early education, Poverty, especially Campaign 2000, LHINS, Water, Human Rights, changes to CFUW governance (not enough information, not enough time), youth at risk (Pathways to Education), distribution of low-cost drugs to third world countries, raising funds for scholarships, El Reform.

Most clubs met with local politicians, and also participated in fundraising and community activities:

Updates were presented on ongoing issues of concern:

#### Poverty Reduction (Hamilton)

The government's Poverty Reduction Strategy (to cut child poverty by 25% by 2013) was noted, as was its budget increasing the Child Benefit, but was criticized for making no mention of child care or food supplements, and raising welfare rates by a meagre 2%. A promised major review of the system has not materialized, and the practice of clawing back students' earnings from social assistance-receiving families payments is still in place. 25 in 5 groups are pushing for a \$100 per month food supplement for those on Social Assistance. Members were asked to write to their MPPs on these issues, and to seek out a questionnaire (www.dothemath.thestop.org) revealing their actual cost of living, for comparison to that of those on Social Assistance. They could then refer this information to their MPPs.

CFUW-Mississauga reported that there is no budget to provide dental care for seniors, and members were asked to check the situation in their own areas.

#### Water (Southport)

Carolyn Day praised the activities of local activists in the scrapping of a proposed dump site over a pristine aquifer in Tiny Township, and actions taken by the provincial government on conservation and water protection issues. Other areas of concern include development being allowed on Lake Simcoe even as environmental studies are being carried out, an industrial complex on Highway 400 with no access to water and any public transit, and particularly intra-basin transfers, pipes connecting the basins of Lake Simcoe and Lake Ontario, and Lake Huron and Lake St.Clair. Members were urged to write their MPPs on these issues.

A reminder: October 18 is "Persons Day". On that date in 1929, women were considered "persons" under the British North America Act. It is a good case in Social Justice! For information about this very important date and to find out more about the "Famous Five", go to the National Library and Archives website at www.collectionscanada.ca (I typed the words "Famous Five" in the Search.)

#### Afternoon Session: Education

As the Chair of the Education Committee, Wendy Taylor had another commitment on Saturday, the President of the Ontario Council, Myra Willis, chaired the meeting.

Myra introduced Marianne Waraich-Singh, National Director of Education on the

National Board of CFUW, to the group. Marianne drew on her extensive knowledge of Aboriginal Education to give us an in depth talk on the difficulties facing Aboriginal students who are endeavouring to get themselves a post-secondary education.

Among the many roadblocks that were cited poverty was by far the most devastating. One particular catastrophe is that there is no money to build high schools on the reserves and students have to go off reserve for their education. Due to inconsistencies from reserve to reserve in the deployment of money earmarked for education, many Aboriginals seemed unable to access money necessary for their ongoing education. When young people leave the reserve it seems that often there is no money for them.

Many other factors affect the educational life of children on the reserve itself. Poor health, substandard housing, overcrowding, alcoholism and unemployment are among the worst offenders.

Some anecdotal evidence of failures to get high school education for some Aboriginal children was cited by some of the members of the committee. Marianne said she could help by offering to come and speak and give information to any clubs interested in action plans. Her e-mail address and phone number are recorded in the roster of Executives on the National Board.

The second part of the session was devoted to finding out what the clubs in attendance were looking at this year in the field of education. Most clubs cited their bursary and scholarship fund raising as their main initiatives, but a few hoped their issues groups would gather more information on such items as the full day attendance at school for the JK/SK Children. Myra Willis herself hoped that we might look into the prevalence of bogus "Colleges" providing false professional qualifications as reported in the Torontoi Startarrison
