

CFUW website - How to create a NEW Member Log-In

It is important for every member to get all the information available to members. That is why CFUW National Office created a website that is available to all Members online at cfuw.org. By logging into the Members Only area of the website (requires that the member set up a User Account for herself) they can access a plethora of documents, data, forms and news about what is happening throughout the organization. There are also links to other related websites, direct contact sheets to other Clubs and National Office staff, the IFUW and other organizations with similar mandates.

Please be aware that the following instructions supersede all previous instructions including those in the CFUW Directory.

To create an account to access the members only area of the website: go to http://www.cfuw.org. In the upper left, just below the 'tab' bar you will see 'Members Log-in';

enter the following: username - member123 ; password - password Click 'LOG-IN'

A page will appear to the right. This is where you will enter your first and last name, e-mail address, username and password. Choose something unique to yourself that you can remember. This is your personal member's login account and should not be shared with others. Each member should create her own account.

Keep a record of these account details where they can easily be found for future reference. You can now log-in to the members' area of the website. You will recognize that you are logged in by the greatly expanded choices in the menus.

All members who had a member account on the old website can log in to the new website's 'Members' area'. You will have to reset your password (use your old one if you like) in order to reactivate your account. If the e-mail address that you used to set up your account is old and unused and you have a new e-mail address, this will not work for you because the system will send out a confirmation message to the e-mail on file. If this happens to you or you think it will, please contact me at National Office cfuwgen@rogers.com before proceeding.

Call for action.

Cuts from Status of Women Canada to women's organisations.

There have been several areas where CFUW has taken action either alone or in Coalition with other women's groups as a key member of the Ad Hoc Coalition for Women's Equality and Human Rights.

- 1. Cuts to groups working for programs on women's equality and human rights have happened with great speed since January 2010. Some of you may have heard the radio and TV interviews made with members of the Coalition that have been defunded.
- 2. You may wish to write to your local MP and ask her or him why women are being targeted for defunding. Some groups have been defunded by Status of Women Canada (example: Canadian Research Institute for the Advancement of Women) for no apparent reason since they met the current criteria. Others, like MATCH International were defunded by CIDA in part because of the work that they support overseas in reproductive health care services.
- 3. You will note also that women's groups are the canary in the coal-mine and that they are first in-line. However, some of you may have noticed that human rights groups have also been defunded (KAIROS and Human Rights offices).
- 4. What can I do?
- Watch what is happening on the news and in the media
- Let your local members know about what is happening (share this release with your members)
- Contact your local MP to suggest that you do not support this.

We can expect to see a final vote on THE Gun Control issue which CFUW has supported since 1994. Again, contact your MP and let them know that this is something that you support. MPs are saying that they have not heard from you.

CFUW ONTARIO COUNCIL NEWS...

2010 Ontario Council Annual General Meeting Report

Rosemary Campbell and Pat Joycel attended this conference right after the Banquet on May 14 and 15th in St. Catharines. The theme was Accessibility: Creating Inclusive Communities.

We both attended an excellent workshop to provide guidance for Club Presidents on Friday night. This was followed by a reception that had delicious finger foods as well as interactive disability awareness experiences involving vision, hearing, mobility and cognitive difficulty.

Advocacy Awards were presented at this event. The Toronto Caucus, consisting of the six Toronto Clubs, won an award for their work on poverty. They had met with Toronto officials, politicians and bureaucrats, the United Way and the 25-in-5 Network as well studied employment insurance. Pat Forest and Avery Fleming were our representatives on this.

Saturday started with a full breakfast followed by Ontario Council business that included calling the roll, reports from various committees and the keynote speaker, Rabia S. Khedr. She spoke about the shift away from a medical model of disability to a social model and then a human rights model. She praised Canada for the opportunities she has had. She has a degree from the University of Toronto, is the mother of four children, runs a consulting business and has won a Toronto Community Leadership award while dealing with a rare visual disability.

Workshops after lunch covered topics about the myths of accessibility, the language we use to foster inclusive attitudes and perceptions and the provincial act AODA - the Act on the Accessibility of Disabled Ontarians - which guarantees accessibility by 2025! A panel of four women spoke about their experiences with disabilities that included being deaf, in a wheelchair, having depression and being blind and using a guide dog.

We have a new Regional Director, Valerie Hume who is a member of the Aurora-Newmarket Club. She replaces Joanne Jamieson as the RD. Joanne has moved to Mississauga and will be joining our Executive as the Treasurer.

The Standing Committee dates are as follows: October 2, 2010, January 22, 2011 and March 19, 2011. These are held at Yorkminster United Church at 1585 Yonge Street. The Fall Gathering for our Ontario Central Clubs will be hosted by the Scarborough Club on October 30, 9:00 to 2:00 p.m. at St. Thomas More Church, 2234 Ellesmere Road. The Scarborough Club will be celebrating their 50th Anniversary.

Other Etobicoke members attending the Ontario Council AGM were Ann McElhinney who is the Communications Chair and Webmistress, Teri Shaw the Advocacy Co-ordinator on the Ontario Council and Christine Turkewych. Rosemary and I thank the Club for sponsoring us to attend this very positive and informative conference.

Dear Canadian Federation of University Women- Etobicoke;

I would like to begin by expressing how dear Etobicoke is to me. I grew up in Mimico, in an apartment building facing the lake. Most of my memories consist of instances in which my friends and I taped two hockey sticks together to reach the road hockey ball that was hit into the lake; or, of spending summers reading all the books on the EPL (Etobicoke Public Library) and Elf's reading list. I attended David Hornell Public School, which is (or was, I'm not sure how it is now-a-days) quite a wonderful elementary school. It was a small school that could (at least in those days) focus its time and effort onto each of its students. Primarily, I love how the neighbourhood was multi-ethnic, humble and quiet, without the hustle and bustle of downtown Toronto. Well, we moved in the end, but not away from Etobicoke.

Most importantly, I would like to thank you for your generosity. This university year began with many unexpected financial predicaments. I found myself in the position of not knowing where to find money to pay for tuition, books, etc. Additionally, this is my final year of study, I had planned to take the GRE's and apply to graduate school. Without your bursary, I may have had to take the year off and find a couple of minimum wage jobs to support myself and help out my family. It was almost impossible to focus on school work with so many financial worries. Your bursary has lifted a huge weight off of my shoulders, and has helped me maintain my high academic standing.

CFUW ETOBICOKE NEWS...

Issues Group Report 2009-2010

The Issues Group met at Fairfield seven times (third Thursday evening) during the year.

Topics discussed were dictated partly by CFUW concerns, informed by last year's resolutions, CFUW National and Ontario Council communication and Standing Committee meetings, and partly by members' interests.

CFUW issues looked at included gun control, climate change (in preparation for the Copenhagen Conference), the Pascal Report on early childhood education, financial literacy and the clawback of the Ontario Child Credit from the benefits of those on social assistance. Advocacy letters were prepared and sent to provincial and federal representatives in Etobicoke Lakeshore, Etobicoke Centre, Etobicoke North and Parkdale-High Park on the clawback (provincial) and on gun control and climate change (federal). Members conducted research

on previous resolutions on food inspection and a UN Women's Agency.

Letters were sent to federal representatives at the beginning of the year advising of the CFUW resolutions passed at the CFUW AGM in the summer.

At the request of the executive, comments were prepared on proposed changes to CFUW governance.

Members of the Issues Group researched and presented the proposed 2010 resolutions for the March Resolutions meeting.

Inspired by the presentation of James Bartleman at our October meeting, the group began a study of First Nations' education, including comparing the situation in Ontario with that in other provinces. A letter has been sent to the Federal Government, inquiring as to why federal funding for first nations reserve schools does not match provincial funding for public schools. This project continues, with the intention of more advocacy.

Simmering on the back burner is our previous (and continuing) interest in waste diversion: this has morphed into an examination of Energy from Waste (a provincial issue) which is being tracked for future action.

New members are welcome in this group and those interested in the advocacy aspect of CFUW are invited to look in. Discussions are usually lively, often thought-provoking, and always engaging. CFUW issues are an important focus, but not the only one, and members are invited and encouraged to suggest issues for research, discussioin and possible action.

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Report of April General Meeting:

Speaker: former Citizenship Judge, Agnes Potts

Appointed citizenship judge in Toronto in December 2002, Agnes Potts was noted as being very actively involved in her community, and was Executive Director of the Etobicoke Sports Hall of Fame, vice-chair of the Etobicoke Red Shield Campaign and a partner of the Canadian First Partners, which promotes national unity. Ms. Potts was also a successful businesswoman in real estate. She worked as a teacher for the

Etobicoke Board of Education and was a trustee for the Metropolitan Separate School Board. She is also a former Etobicoke city councillor. Ms. Potts attended McMaster University and Lakeshore Teachers College. She is a recipient of the Commemorative Medal for the 125th Anniversary of the Confederation of Canada and the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal (December 2002).

Agnes arrived in Canada from Italy, in the early 1950s at Pier 21, Halifax. She told many personal stories to illustrate her theme – how blessed she feels to be Canadian, and how

grateful she is for the opportunities she has had to serve her community and raise her family in Canada. With her stories, she came back to her most recent experiences as citizenship judge – the best part being the citizenship ceremonies, and the more difficult being that of writing the decisions denying citizenship to immigrants. Agnes ended with



the story of the dedication of a significant family token, a Madonna given by her grandmother and carried to Canada by Agnes's mother, to the museum at Pier 21, Halifax.

Before the meeting officially began, Ted Morris and friends made a presentation and a plea for signatures on a petition to be presented to the Toronto Board of Education, opposing its plan to sell the park behind Fairfield.



CFUW ETOBICOKE CHARITABLE TRUST

THE CHARITABLE TRUST of the Canadian Federation of University Women-Etobicoke was registered as a charitable organization by Revenue Canada on Sept. 30, 1986.

The Trust functions under its own constitution and the funds are administered by five trustees appointed from the membership of CFUW Etobicoke for three-year terms.

The purpose of The Trust shall be to administer its funds to advance and promote education by providing:

- 1. scholarships and bursaries:
- 2. facilities and equipment for educational purposes;
- 3. support for community organizations.

In 1994 an income-producing fund was established and named after Elizabeth Sweet, the first president of CFUW Etobicoke and now a Life Member. The Department of National Revenue stipulates that donations to this fund be held for a period of not less than ten years.

Funds for The Trust come from three sources:

- \$12.00 of the membership fee which goes toward scholarships and community awards that are distributed in the current fiscal year. The Awards Committee recommends the allocation of this money.
- Donations, memorial gifts, or bequests from members, friends or supporters of CFUW Etobicoke. They are designated by the donor for use in the current or next fiscal year or for the Elizabeth Sweet Capital Fund, to be held for at least 10 years.
- 3. Interest income earned by the Elizabeth Sweet Capital Fund.
