The Executive decided on these guidelines for the coming year:

- 1. That we maintain the high standard of leadership of past Executives by continuing to work collaboratively, following the job descriptions outlined in the Red Books and supporting the aims of CFUW.
- 2. That we promote interest in Ontario Council and National activities by informing the membership of events.
- 3. That we increase scholarship money raised by organizing a Card and Games party in March.

There is a full slate of Officers on the Executive with the Club approval of Barb Willoughby as the Vice-President.

The report of the 2010 National AGM is in this issue and was reported at the September Business meeting. Items of business to be voted on later in the year pertain to late Amendments to the By-laws on membership and the revision of the National Constitution. That information follows. I thank the Issues Group and other members for studying these items and advising the Executive. See the motion to refer that was voted on and carried.

There were two requests from National. The VP for Communications, Doris Mae Oulton, requests volunteers to edit materials that are considered for the National website. E-mail **cfuwadvocacy@rogers.com** if you are interested. Both National and Ontario Central requested a report on the financial support we give not only to scholarships but other organizations. I will submit this with the help of the Charitable Trust.

CFUW NATIONAL NEWS...

National AGM Report July 15-18, Ottawa

The theme of this year's AGM was *Value Our Past: Shape the Future*. The Ottawa Club assisted by the other local Clubs hosted this event at the Marriott Hotel. They were celebrating their 100th anniversary!

The Conference opened with a reception followed by pre-arranged dinner groups in downtown Ottawa. This gave us the opportunity to walk back to the hotel past the Parliament Buildings and visit the Famous Five monument on the hill.

Friday morning started bright and early with the Charitable Trust Breakfast. The speaker was the biographer, Charlotte Gray, who spoke about her recent subject of Nellie McClung.

This was followed by the Business Sessions with the various reports from the President of National and IFUW, the outgoing Executive Director, Treasurer, Charitable Trust Director, Communications, Membership, and Governance Chair, and a report on the proposed revision of the National Constitution and By-Laws. This ended the current two-year Biennium of the National Executive. Phyliss Scott from Vancouver ran for President of the IFUW at the Conference in Mexico. The new President, Marianne Haslegrave, is from England. The new Executive Director is Robin Jackson.

Plans are being developed for CFUW's 100th in 2019, and these were outlined. CARE Canada presented CFUW with an award in appreciation of the \$12,000 raised that, when matched, totalled \$36,000 this year.

A panel discussion presented views on *Afghanistan: Security, Diplomacy and Development.* A Brigadier, Assistant Deputy Minister, a representative from Foreign Affairs and a VP from Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) presented views on the situation and Canada's involvement now and in the future. The consensus was that this will be a long process with a political solution needed.

The Resolution debate followed with these results:

Passed:

- ✓ Chrysotile Asbestos and Canada's Responsibility in the International Trade of Hazardous Substances.
- ✓ The Funding of Aboriginal Education
- ✓ Mobilizing the Will to Intervene
- \checkmark X Prostitution of Women and Children Clause #1 referred back to the Resolutions Committee, while Clauses #2 and #3 were adopted.

Defeated:

× Protecting Canadians from Health Hazards associated with Exposure to Electromagnetic Fields from High Voltage Overhead Power Lines

Passed:

✓ All UN Security Resolutions on Peace and Security for Women and Children.

Chez Nous dinner parties were held Friday night. This facilitates meeting other members on a social basis connecting us across the country.

Workshops involved both CFUW topics and presentations on Afghani topics. I attended a Leadership Workshop.

The Banquet on Saturday night celebrated Ottawa's 100th birthday. The Honourable Flora Macdonald attended as did Dr. Ruth Bell. Alaina Podmorrow, 13, founder of Little Women for Little Women in Afghanistan introduced the keynote speaker, Dr. Sima Samar, who told us that it is only in recent times services to women have been curtailed. She has worked to provide medical facilities for women and children, and recommended Canada stay involved, invest in the country and keep engagements respectful of human rights and dignity.

The Toronto Caucus, of which we are part, won an award for their work on Poverty.

The conference concluded with an address by the incoming President Brenda Wallace. This is the beginning of a new biennium. The theme will be *The Right to Speak - the Responsibility to Act.* The new Governance model passed in the last year now comes in to effect.

Rosemary Campbell and Christine Turkewych also attended from CFUW Etobicoke. Rosemary drove to Ottawa and back. A special thanks to her. I would like to thank the Club for the opportunity to attend this informative and enjoyable conference. You can access a longer, illustrated report on the national website.

Revision of the Constitution and By-Law Amendments.

A Committee was mandated at the Winnipeg AGM 2009 to revise the constitution of CFUW National. The final draft was presented to the National Board in June 2010 and to the AGM in July to be taken back to Clubs for discussion and feedback. Feedback from Clubs is needed by January 7, 2011. There were Amendments to the By-Laws submitted too late to be voted on at the AGM. However, they were discussed in the Committee of the Whole. Secondary amendments may be submitted until October 15, 2010. The final vote will take place by mail, fax or e-mail on December 7, 2010.

Executive Vote: The Executive voted to send the study of these documents to the Issues Group, who have accepted the work.

Motion: moved by Barb Willoughby, Seconded by Rosemary Campbell, and carried: THAT the Issues Group will study the Amendments to the current By-laws and the Constitution Revision and make recommendations to the Executive before voting deadlines.

This motion was put to the membership at the September General Meeting, and carried.
