Our speaker for October, Peggy Nash, had to attend and speak at a Conference in Geneva. She did secure another speaker for us, June Macdonald, who is a fellow CFUW member of the North York Club. A summary, made by our Recording Secretary, Helle Tosine, is printed below, as this is a topic of concern for CFUW members.

The Long Gun Registry was saved by a vote in Parliament. This is an issue CFUW has supported since 2006. The Prime Minister has promised to re-open the issue.

CFUW National have developed a list of strategies they intend to implement to improve web and written communications in the organization.

Seven members of Etobicoke attended the Standing Committees. The theme for the morning session was Sexual Abuse addressed by three speakers. The reports of this and the afternoon sessions are in this issue. I wish to thank Peggy Pinkerton, Barb Willoughby and Linda Rose for attending and writing these reports. The next session will be 22, 2011, and the theme will be Education.

The Advocacy Group (Issues) will submit their recommendations on the Bylaw Amendments to the Executive by November 4, for their consideration. The Executive will then make recommendations to the Club members by November 11, when the vote will take place. The Club is required to send the decision by December 7 to CFUW National.

Barb Willoughby, Linda Rose and I will have attended the Fall Gathering of The Ontario Central Clubs on October 30. The report on this will be in the December/January issue.

Those attending the October meeting donated \$720 to the Food Bank. Linda Johnson assisted the Club in the collection.

CFUW ONTARIO COUNCIL NEWS...

Ontario Council Standing Committee Meeting, October 2, 2010 Morning Session: Sexual Violence from Horror to Healing

The first speaker was Rhea Pretsell, President of CFUW Belleville & District and the Ontario Council Chair of the Women and Human Rights Committee. She presented her paper entitled Sexual Violence as a Weapon of War: The Case in the Congo. This discussion paper was chosen to be presented at the IFUW Triennial in Mexico City last summer. The historical background of hostilities in the Congo dates back to Belgium's rule, the Mobutu era, and ongoing tribal hostilities. The sexual violence perpetrated by all armed groups in the Congo is the worst seen anywhere in the world. Rape victims, judged to be soiled and dirty, suffer in shame and silence. The present situation is fueled by demand for natural resources and the militarization of the mineral trade. The international community has a responsibility to protect and to promote the establishment of a civil society that builds democracy and educates its women and girls.

The next speaker was Jacqueline Benn-John, Executive Director of the Sexual Assault and Violence Intervention Services of Halton, and the president of the Ontario Coalition for Rape Crisis Centres. The OCRCC has been in consultation with the government to establish a Sexual Violence Action Plan. There is a long waiting list for services and centres need the capacity to respond. The plan will focus on prevention through education and publicity, improved community services, training for staff, and better co-ordination between agencies. The goal is to establish long-term solutions, not just temporary easing of problems. The consultation document is online at the Ontario Women's Directorate which is one of the responsibilities of Laurel Broten's ministry.

The final speaker was Kim Charlebois, the Executive Director of the Sexual Assault Centre for Quinte & District. The focus of her presentation was the healing process, which is unique to each person. They had seen a need among their clients for a residential healing program in addition to the personal and group therapy available. They developed a one-week program to serve a group of ten in a rural setting. The *Paths of Courage* is a holistic program that includes intensive therapy in the morning coupled with physical, emotional and spiritual emphases.

The morning session ended with a presentation by the Burlington Club. They role-played visits with various elected officials that were both educational and highly entertaining.

Gail Marriot is the new Chair for this Committee. A general discussion of issues in education was contributed by the various Club delegates. Some of these were the new Provincial Kindergarten Programme implementation, financial literacy, funding discrepancy, bussing and the use of technology in the schools. Names of possible speakers were suggested for the January 22, 2011 session. The Education Committee will host this session.

Legislation Committee Report:

Emphasis was on the upcoming municipal elections, and by way of introducing themselves and their clubs, members outlined local concerns and sometime action, among which were: affordable housing, supportive housing, power stations, seniors' services, poverty, bicycle paths, LHINS, shortage of doctors.

The meeting broke into smaller groups, each of which focused on specific topics and on strategies to make effective representation to candidates, and to generally be more effective municipal citizens. Clubs (and members) were urged to:

- Pay more attention to municipal politics and monitor council meetings.
- Research local needs and choose your issue (affordable housing, transit, help for mental health patients, seniors and homeless youth, street safety, zoning and green space were mentioned).
- Encourage club members to attend All Candidates meetings.
- Formulate specific questions, trying for relevance to CFUW concerns.
- Inundate candidates with letters, phone calls.
- Put forward good candidates and support them.
- Establish workshops to encourage women to run.
- Encourage club members to volunteer for local boards, to involve themselves (and their club) in the local scene.

One group focused on needs of older adults:

- All municipalities should have long-term care policy and institutions: clubs should monitor those in their area.
- Sufficient staff and funding must be in place to ensure specific mandated hours of care.

In pushing issues, it was considered more effective to write letters than email, and to write individual, rather than form, letters.

Status of Women and Human Rights Committee Report:

Rhea Pretsell told us of her involvement in CFUW Belleville and District and stressed the importance of making connections in the local community.

Everyone had an opportunity to share ideas of how the clubs in Ontario are advocating in women's issues in our many communities.

These are some of the actions and ideas in which various clubs have participated:

- members served on women's shelter Boards:
- petition sent out about the gun registry;
- partnerships were formed with sexual assault centres, immigrant services groups, local branches of Amnesty International;
- organized a house tour as major fundraise;.
- donated children's books as Christmas presents;
- met with MPP to discuss national Resolutions;
- gave gifts to women in shelters on Mother's Day;
- disseminated FLEW material;
- had a "virtual" advocacy group whose members phone/write to MPPs,
 etc., as issues develop throughout the year;
- held auctions, lunches, card parties, book sales for fundraising e.g.
 CARE Canada.

Ardith Toogood (CIR for CFUW National) spoke to our group and reminded us of these special days: October 18 - Person's Day; December 6 - National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women; and March 8 - International Women's Day. HAPPY PERSONS DAY! OCT. 18, 2010

81 Years ago today women were finally declared to be "Persons". The decision was in response to the work of five women known as the "famous Five": Emilie Murphy, Nellie McClung, Louise McKinney, Irene Parlby and Henrietta Muir Edwards who petitioned the Supreme Court to define the words "persons" as inclusive of women. Women had been elected to the House of Commons but could not sit in the Senate because they were not considered "persons" under the law.

The Supreme Court ruled against them, but the women took the case to the final court of appeal, the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council. On Oct. 18, 1929, the Council ruled that the word "persons" included members of both the male and female sex and that women "are eligible to be summoned to and become members of the Senate of Canada."

For the past 30 years, Status of Women Canada has presented Governor General's Awards to five women who have contributed to women's equality. This year the winners were M Marie Louise Fish, Lucille Harper, Kerline Joseph, Anne Michaud and Barbara Mowat.

October Speaker: JUNE McDONALD

June McDonald, a fellow CFUW member from North York, recently completed a doctorate with voting system reform as a focus and has been a college educator for the past 20 years. She was one of the founders of the Fair Vote Canada, Toronto Chapter.

June, who has been involved with this issue for over 15 years, spoke of Doris Anderson as her inspiration in attracting her to the important issue of electoral reform and participatory representation in Canada's parliamentary system. She also noted that her comments this evening were as a result of recent discussions with Peggy Nash.

June quoted from several well-known Canadians, including Ed Broadbent, to explain how Canada's system should be changed. The current system that Canada has, "first past the post" fails to provide representation for all voters. This system represents only those voters who support the most popular party in their riding. The political views of other voters are not represented.

June explained that because many voters, often the majority, do not

elect an MP, over-all election results are distorted. A party winning only 40% of the votes may gain 60% or more of the seats and 100% of the power. A party winning 30% of the votes could find itself with only 10% of the seats. For example, in the last election more than 60% of Quebec voters cast votes for federalist parties but the voting system gave two-thirds of the seats to a separatist party. Over 940,000 Canadians, many of them young people, voted for the Green Party but gained no representation in Parliament.

Because of these large misrepresentations, Canada is generally ruled by majority governments which did not win a majority of votes. Canada has had only four governments elected by a majority of voters since World War I.

June believes that proportional representation (PR) can provide solutions to these issues. She brought forward examples from Germany and other EU countries which use PR systems, the basis of which is to get as close as possible to treating every voter equally - or in other words, to create true representative democracy. Countries using fair voting systems generally have higher voter turnouts.

When each vote has equal value, election results are proportional. A party that receives 40% of the votes will receive close to 40% of the seats in the legislature, not 60% or more. A party which receives 20% of the votes will win close to 20% of the seats, not 10% or none at all.

Fair voting systems tend to produce parliaments with more women and visible minorities. Because parties have to nominate lists of candidates to compete in each region, they quickly learn that candidate lists reflecting the diversity of the population usually attract more votes.

In closing, June encouraged CFUW members to speak to their MPPs and MPs about PR to gain support to reform the Canadian parliamentary system.


