PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE ...

I was glad to be able to welcome everyone at Fairfield on February 9th. When looking for an alternative location it becomes apparent that we have a very good meeting place. It is in a convenient location, the staff is very co-operative, and the rent is reasonable.

Our speaker at the February meeting, Neil Hetherington, from Habitat for Humanity brought such an encouraging message. As we see reports of the situation of the working poor in the city who have to go to food banks and live in substandard housing while struggling to pay the rent, it is reassuring to know that creative organizations are working within the system to find solutions. They are able to build a house for \$130,000 with a portion of the materials and land donated, and with the labour of many volunteers and the future homeowners. Their use of "radical common sense" and their successes in dealing with local government provide a model that should be pursued more widely. CFUW has policy on Affordable Housing. As stated in our 2012 CFUW brief to the Standing Committee on Finance:

CFUW calls on the federal, provincial, territorial and Aboriginal Governments to put in place a National Housing Strategy that provides affordable and safe housing to low income people and that addresses the housing crisis, curbs costs and helps lift lower income families from poverty.

Social housing programs are cost effective.

Affordable housing costs \$5,000 - \$8,000 per year/per person Emergency shelters cost \$13,000 - \$42,000 " "

In late January Vice-President, Pat Ferbyack, Toronto Caucus Representative Avery Fleming, and I attended a meeting of the CFUW Toronto Caucus. The caucus of the six Toronto clubs was formed after the city was amalgamated. All present agreed that the caucus meetings are valuable and should be continued. For the last six years the caucus has operated on a minimal budget and it was decided that clubs would contribute 25 cents per member for caucus expenses, not necessarily an annual contribution. The caucus has been researching Early Learning and their work will soon result in a national CFUW campaign. Watch for details of a CFUW sponsored community meeting to be held in late April. The speaker will be the Hon.Margaret McCain, co-author of the third edition of *The Early*

Years Study: Making Decisions, Taking Action.

There's no better place to be on International Women's Day than at a CFUW meeting, particularly our Resolutions Meeting. Come and join in the lively discussion of this year's six resolutions. CFUW ONTARIO COUNCIL NEWS...

Ontario Council Standing Committee Meetings January 21, 2012

The morning's topic dealt with the impact of Climate Change on mental health. The presenter was Ashlee Cunsolo Willox, PhD candidate in the School of Environmental Design and Rural Development at the University of Guelph, and a social science researcher with special interest in the impact of climate change on aboriginal people. Her research has been in Rigolet, a small Inuit community in northern Labrador.

She began with background on the evolution of climate change, emphasizing the increasing speed of recent changes: in the past 30 years the rate of warming has doubled that of the previous 130 years, and the 10 warmest years on record have been since 2001. The change is most marked in the polar regions, as melting snow accelerates the absorption of heat, causing more melting. She followed this with recent history of the Inuit, outlining the effect of the one-two punch that has impacted them:

Government policies in the past 50 years which "for its own good" took a nomadic, land-based, shamanistic culture, subsisting on hunting and fishing, with a strong identification with the land and animals, and mandated for it settled communities, residential schools and a wage-based economy where there were no wages.

Changes in lifestyle caused by climate change. Warmer weather and decreased snow and ice coupled with more severe storms have adversely affected plants and wildlife, making hunting more difficult and unpredictable, and resulting in less time being spent on the land. This has resulted in dietary changes – the lack of wild food has driven people to store-bought food, which is extremely expensive, leading to unbalanced diets – and a more sedentary lifestyle. Previously unknown health issues – obesity, diabetes, gastro-intestinal problems, are rife. Social and emotional issues include loss of language, cultural assimilation and increasing marginalization. Masculine identity, formerly defined by hunting prowess and native skills, has been undermined.

The social disruption caused by these changes has had severe mental health impact on the community, resulting in depression, anxiety, anger, increased family stress, increased alcohol and drug use, increased attempted and successful suicide, disruption of the Inuit sense of place, a disruption described as being similar to that caused by the residential schools: "It's not home any more."

Ms. Willox's project is to document the Inuit experience through collecting stories, production of a video archive, and instructing individuals in the use of social media to raise awareness of their situation. -Peggy Pinkerton

Ontario Council Standing Committee on Legislation

Following her presentation to everyone in the morning, Ms. Willox joined the legislation group for our afternoon session.

Ms. Willox's topic for this session was "Lament for the Land: Climate Change, Mourning and Grief". Her research has identified the mourning that occurs when a people lose their land and their lifestyle. We were asked to consider times we have mourned when the loss is not of a person. Examples from the group ranged from the loss of a beloved forest to the loss of life in a city that one had left. Ashlee pointed out that as the lnuit are losing the land and lifestyle with which they are familiar, they suffer grief and are in mourning. It is necessary for this grief to be recognized and acknowledged, not only by those experiencing it, but also by those of us living in the south. Ashlee showed us video clips prepared by the people in Rigolet, Labrador: "digital storytelling" and "photovoice" are methods used to allow people to express their loss. These can be found on YouTube by "googling" Rigolet Nunatsiavut You Tube. As one considers these issues, it is important to take action to slow climate change as well as allowing and supporting the expression of grief and mourning among the people most immediately and directly affected by the changes that are occurring.

Ontario Council Status of Women & Human Rights Committee

Christine Cooper, executive director of FAME (Family Association for Mental Health Everywhere), told us that mental illness is the number one health problem in Canada. It affects everyone, either directly (1 in 5) or through association with someone who is suffering from a mental illness. But it has a stigma attached to it. Four out of ten people in prison suffer from mental illness. The police tend to use tasers more on mentally ill people. They often don't know how to de-escalate a domestic situation involving a mentally ill person, too often resulting in death. Many of the homeless suffer from mental illnesses. Many provinces do not cover newer more effective drugs in their drug plans or may require a person to try less effective drugs first. It may take eight years to get to a point where a patient is being effectively treated. There is a shortage of psychiatrists and many plans will not cover therapists. The recent federal legislation providing compassionate leave for family members to take care of a very ill person does not include mental illnesses.

Seventy percent of people who are mentally ill live with family member(s). If family are involved in care there is less chance of police involvement or hospitalization and more adherence to treatment. FAME provides support to families and caregivers where any mental illness is an issue. FAME receives funding from the Ministry of Health through Local Health Integrated Networks (LHINs) with 18% covering administration costs and 85% for programming.

As well as providing confidential one-on-one support by telephone or in person, they have resource material, educational speaker series, family socials, newsletters and support programs. One very innovative program is fameKids for children 7-12 who have a family member with a mental illness. It educates and equips children with coping skills through artwork, discussion and games in a safe, kid-friendly environment. For more information see the FAME website www.fameforfamilies.com.

Ontario Council Standing Committee on Education

The topic at the Standing Committee on Education was Bill 13: An Act to amend the Education Act with respect to bullying and other matters. Bill 13 seeks to include and define bullying in the Education Act. In 1998, CFUW agreed on policy to urge the government to:

1. take effective action to counter all forms of violence at school and ensure the security of all those at risk

2. develop awareness of the need to counter all forms of violence, ranging from bullying to sexual aggression

OC president Myra Willis and secretary Elizabeth Haynes led a discussion of Bill 13 and then the group worked on a letter that could be sent by clubs to their MPPs. This exercise provided useful guidelines to consider when writing to elected members in support of CFUW policy. The letter in support of Bill 13 is available on the OC Council website, cfuwontcouncil.ca.

There was also a follow up on the funding of Ontario post secondary education, student debt load, and actions of the Canadian Federation of Students – *Ontario*.
